


Head of Academy's Message Whole School Attendance: 96%



Year 5 Weekly Attendance: 96%

Writing suspenseful narratives and crafting descriptive spine poems are creative activities that encourage imagination and language skills. In maths, working on fractions by finding fractions of amounts is an important foundational skill and it's great to see that being addressed. PE with dodgeball provided a fun way to stay active while learning teamwork and coordination. Incorporating music with guitar sessions added another dimension to the Year 5's learning experience. Year 4 Weekly Attendance: 95%

It has been a very busy first week back for Year 4! In maths, we have started our new unit looking at length and perimeter. Year 4 have been busy calculating the lengths of sides and accurately drawing rectangles for certain perimeters. In writing, Year 4 have been delving into what discussion text are and how to have a balanced argument. To aid this, Year 4 took part in an exciting class-based courtroom drama inspired by our class reading book "The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane". We stepped into the shoes of the characters from the story, took on roles of lawyers, jurors, and questioners. With passion and conviction, Year 4 debated and deliberated on the crucial question "who should Edward Tulane live with?". In science, we kick started our new electricity unit with a double session looking at what items are electrical and if they required a plug and socket, batteries (cells) or both, as well as making our own circuits in teams. The highlight of our week was a visit from the Methodist church, who treated us to an enriching visit filled with music, storytelling, and insights into our upcoming trip. We cannot wait for the visit next week!



Year 6 Weekly Attendance: 95%

In maths this week, students have delved into statistics. This involved learning about interpretation and the presentation of data. In writing, the focus has been on diary entries. Students have had the opportunity to explore the personal and reflective nature of diary writing, capturing their thoughts, feelings, and experiences in a narrative form. This exercise not only hones their creative writing skills but also provides a space for self-expression and introspection. In science, the exploration of voltage in a circuit and its impact on components suggests a focus on electrical circuits. Students learned about the relationship between voltage and current in circuits, gaining insights into how changes in voltage can affect the behaviour of different components. This hands-on exploration of electrical concepts contributes to a practical understanding of basic physic principles.

The Government have launched a new website aimed at parents, teachers and school leaders to give practical advice on protecting young people from extremism and radicalisation.
